Description: The most common oak in the Rocky Mountains. It's very adaptable to different soils and moisture levels. Gambel Oak will grow taller with more moisture. In dry landscapes, it will get no taller than a large shrub.

Q. gambelii features attractive deeply lobed leaves which turn from green to shades of red, orange and yellow in the fall. Gambel oaks do not have any serious pest or disease problems, making them a very easy plant in the landscape. This oak does need space, as it has a tendency to spread from the roots to form thickets.
